AMERICAN FRIENDS OF THE MAURITSHUIS

The Mauritshuis is internationally recognized as a veritable "pearl" among the world's great museums. Situated in the heart of The Hague — adjacent to the stately government buildings and office of the Prime Minister of the Netherlands — the Mauritshuis is celebrated for its collection which includes some of the most important collections of seventeenth-century Dutch and Flemish paintings. More than two hundred important works from the Dutch and Flemish Masters are on display in the intimate rooms of the seventeenth century mansion, including such masterpieces as Vermeer's *Girl with a Pearl Earring*, Rembrandt's *The Anatomy Lesson of Dr. Nicolaes Tulp*, and *The Goldfinch* by Carel Fabritius. In addition, the collection includes genre paintings by Jan Steen, landscapes by Jacob van Ruisdael, still lifes by Adriaen Coorte, and portraits by Rubens that reveal the very best of seventeenth-century Dutch and Flemish painting.

The American Friends of the Mauritshuis, a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt corporation, was founded in 1982 to strengthen ties between the Mauritshuis and American art lovers of this golden era of Dutch painting. Its primary goals are the following:

- To support the work of the Mauritshuis in the broadest sense possible
- To create awareness amongst the American public of the Mauritshuis and its collection
- To offer curatorial and conservation fellowships of American graduate students

Over the past several years, the American Friends has made a number of important contributions to the Mauritshuis, including the ongoing support for what is now a Fulbright Fellowship in painting conservation in collaboration with the University of Amsterdam (UvA). The Fulbright-American Friends of the Mauritshuis Grant has attracted a number of very talented students preparing for a career in conservation and restoration work.

FULBRIGHT-AMERICAN FRIENDS OF THE MAURITSHUIS FELLOWSHIP

Since 1985 the American Friends of the Mauritshuis (AFMh) has offered a fellowship to several outstanding American students. The Mauritshuis and its conservation studio are devoted to the highest level of technical research and are committed to providing advanced training opportunities for students to learn the art of paintings conservation and restoration.

In 2016, the AFMh entered into a cooperation with the Fulbright Program which offers even more possibilities to students with a strong interest and/or experience in the conservation and restoration of Old Master paintings. The American Friends are proud to join in the Fulbright tradition by establishing the Fulbright-American Friends of the Mauritshuis Grant which will be awarded on an annual basis. The grant will focus on the study, examination and treatment of works of art in the collection of the Mauritshuis, in combination with a tailor made study program at the University of Amsterdam. The University of Amsterdam is the only university in the Netherlands offering a study program in Conservation and Restoration (consisting of nine specializations).

The grantee will gain practical experience and knowledge treating paintings in the conservation studio of the Mauritshuis, under the supervision of the conservators of the museum. The grantee will participate in workshops, (informal) lectures, symposia and other events at the university. During the grant period, research will not only include paintings in the Mauritshuis collection, but also pictures in other Dutch and/or European institutions.

The prestigious Fulbright grant will be offered through the network of the Fulbright Center and its US partner. The grantee will be enrolled as a research fellow at the University of Amsterdam and will receive a program specially designed for their educational experience. It will consist of coursework and a practical fellowship in the conservation studio of the Mauritshuis. In the past, fellows have been chosen from graduate students.

The Fulbright-American Friends of the Mauritshuis Grant can now consider applicants who have already graduated from their universities but not yet begun graduate studies, thereby offering a broad group from which to choose. Besides the higher profile which the Fulbright association bestows, the collaboration with Fulbright and the UvA provides an important contribution to the training of young conservators who are still in need of practical experience. The first Fulbright fellow has started at the Mauritshuis in September 2017.

CAMPAIGN FOR FULBRIGHT FUND

The launch of the partnership with Fulbright signals an important new phase in the mission of the American Friends and commitment to American students determined to pursue a career in art conservation. In order to ensure the long-term continuance of this important fellowship, the American Friends have announced a campaign to establish a \$650,000 fund to provide a stable source of underwriting resources. Donations in any amount are welcome and most appreciated; however, Major Donors of \$50,000 and more will be recognized as "Founding Partners" in the Fulbright-American Friends of the Mauritshuis Grant.

The annual costs of the Fulbright AFMh Fellowship are approximately at €20,000 (or roughly \$22,500) per year. Most museum endowments maintain a payout level of 5% annually, with the remaining 95% invested conservatively to support the sustainability of programmatic activities.
